Gore served as a Professor of Systematic Theology (now Emeritus) at Erskine Theological Seminary for 30 years and served 20 years as Dean of the Seminary (now Emeritus). TAKE ACTION BILLS! Top Advocacy in Action (AIA) Issues

Restore TRICARE for Life coverage of GLP-1 medications. Military retirees and their families enrolled in TRICARE for Life (TFL) lost coverage of GLP-1 medications in 2025, even though younger TRICARE beneficiaries who meet the same clinical criteria continue to receive coverage. Medications are not covered for cosmetic purposes; they require medical approval.

The Work Opportunity Tax Credit (WOTC) has played a key role in keeping veteran unemployment rates closer to civilian levels. Originally designed to support “job seekers who have consistently faced barriers to employment,” this definition clearly applies to military spouses, who have faced sustained unemployment rates of 20% or higher for over a decade.

Secure a vote on the Major Richard Star Act, which would authorize combat-injured veterans to receive their earned DoD retirement pay for years of service and their VA disability compensation for lifelong injury. Currently, these combat-injured (and often seriously disabled) veterans are subject to a cost-saving offset—often described as a “veterans’ tax”—where their retirement pay is reduced for every dollar of VA disability received.

Advance more than 20 standalone MOAA-supported bills, bringing reforms the association has championed in the 119th Congress (and in several previous sessions) on behalf of servicemembers, veterans, caregivers, survivors, and their families. More than 60 provisions in the Take Care of America's Veterans Act address veterans’ benefits, health care, education, transition assistance, caregiver support, and survivor benefits. Four of these provisions are long-standing priorities for MOAA:

- **Major Richard Star Act**
- **Veteran Caregiver Reeducation, Reemployment, and Retirement (3R) Act**
- **Love Lives On Act**
- **Justice for ALS Veterans Act**

FEDERAL LEGISLATION

S. 3168 - Shutdown Fairness Act -Allows the Pentagon and the Department of Homeland Security to continue paying servicemembers during any future funding lapse.

H.R.9105/S. 4646 - SAFEGUARD Veterans Act of 2026 - To reinstate criminal penalties for persons charging veterans unauthorized fees relating to claims for benefits under the laws administered by the Secretary of VA.

H.R.3726/ S.3119 - Fisher House Availability Act of 2026 - expands eligibility for temporary lodging at a Fisher House to additional individuals receiving medical care or treatment at a VA or non-VA facility or those accompanying individuals receiving such treatment.

H.R.8732 - Pensions for Retired Uniformed Servicemembers Act - to pay retired pay from the Department of Defense Military Retirement Fund to retired members of the commissioned corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and of the Public Health Service.

H.R.6038 - Improving Veteran Access to Care Act - directs Secretary of VA to establish an integrated project team to improve the process for scheduling appointments from the VA.

H.R.6024 - BRAVE Act of 2025 - To improve mental health services of the VA.

BILLS OF INTEREST to Veterans, Servicemembers, and Families in SC
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H 4605 – to amend the South Carolina laws so as to enact the "veteran suicide and mental health crisis response act"; and by adding section 25-15-50 so as to create guaranteed immediate mental health crisis access for veterans, establish mobile veteran crisis response teams, require same-day suicide intervention care statewide, and to provide for funding and accountability. House Committee.

H.4600- A bill to amend the South Carolina Code of Laws by amending Section 12-37-220, relating to property tax exemptions, so as to exempt a certain percent of the fair market of an owner-occupied residential property if the owner is a Veteran with a service-connected disability. House Committee.

H.4575- A concurrent resolution to memorialize the United States Congress to adopts the Major Richard Star Act to allow all medically retired service members to receive full access to their retirement pay and benefits. House Committee.

H 4700 - to amend the South Carolina code of laws by amending section, relating to the home and vehicle property tax exemptions for disabled veterans, so as to allow disabled veterans who are not totally and permanently disabled to claim a percentage of the exemption equal to the percentage of the disabled veteran's service-connected disability. House Committee.

H3943 – A veteran who has a disability rating issued by the United States Department of Veteran Affairs is allowed a nonrefundable income tax credit equal to the product of his disability rating percent and his income tax liability. However, the amount of the credit may not exceed five thousand dollars each year. House Committee.

H.4812- A bill to amend the South Carolina Code of Laws by amending Section 12-6-1171, relating to the Military Retirement Income Deduction, so as to include a qualified retirement plan for an officer of the Commissioned Corps of the United States Public Health Service and the Commissioned Corps of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration in the definition of "retirement income". House Committee.

H.3463- A bill to amend the South Carolina Code of Laws by amending Section 12-37-220, relating to property tax exemptions, so as to provide that certain surviving spouses are eligible for the exemption. House Committee.

S.0754/H 4811 - A bill to amend the South Carolina Code of Laws, relating to use of facilities free of charge by disabled Veterans, so as to allow any South Carolina resident who is a Veteran to enter any state park free of charge.
